#### Music at Hardwicke Parochial Primary Academy

#### **Purpose of study**

At Hardwicke, we understand that music is a universal language that embodies one of the highest forms of creativity. We want our children to develop a life-long love of music, singing and playing musically with increasing confidence and control, whilst cultivating an understanding of musical composition. A high quality music education should engage and inspire pupils to develop a love of music and their talent as musicians, and so increase their self-confidence, creativity and sense of achievement. As pupils progress, they should develop a critical engagement with music, allowing them to compose, and to listen with discrimination to the best in the musical canon. We use the Kapow Music Scheme to support our teaching and learning which introduces children to music from all around the world and across generations, teaching children to respect and appreciate the music of all traditions and communities. The Kapow Music Scheme takes a holistic approach to music, in which the individual strands (performing, listening, composing, the history of music and the inter-related dimensions of music) are woven together to create engaging and enriching learning experiences.

### Aims in Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2

The national curriculum for music aims to ensure that all pupils:

- Perform, listen to, review and evaluate music across a range of historical periods, genres, styles and traditions, including the works of the great composers and musicians
- Learn to sing and to use their voices
- To create and compose music on their own and with others
- Have the opportunity to learn a musical instrument, use technology appropriately and have the opportunity to progress to the next level of musical excellence
- Understand and explore how music is created, produced and communicated, including through the inter-related dimensions: pitch, duration, dynamics, tempo, timbre, texture, structure and appropriate musical notations.

## Aims in Early Years Foundation Stage

#### Expressive arts and designs: Early Learning Goal-Being Imaginative and Expressive

Children at the expected level of development will: - Invent, adapt and recount narratives and stories with peers and their teacher; - Sing a range of well-known nursery rhymes and songs; Perform songs, rhymes, poems and stories with others, and - when appropriate - try to move in time with music.
